Their, There, or They're?

Their is a <u>possessive pronoun</u>. It always describes a noun.

Note the spelling of **their.** It comes from the word **they**, so the e comes before the i.

There is an adverb meaning "that location." It is sometimes used with the verb **to be** as an idiom. It is spelled like **here** which means "this location."

They're is a <u>contraction</u> of **they are.** Note the spelling: The *a* from **are** is replaced by an apostrophe.

Examples: Their dog has fleas. (possessive of *they*)

I put the collar right there. (that location)

There are four prime numbers less than ten. (with *to be*)

They're 2, 3, 5, and 7. (contraction of *they are*)

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In other words:

They're always means *they are*.

Their always means **belongs to them**.

Use *there* for everything else.
